S K Kim – *Notes from the North*

These poems are urgent bulletins from an emergency, they are horrific, powerful, astute, full of passion and moral authority. Although we've heard about the brutal dictatorship of North Korea before, these poems surpass journalism and bring us the voices on the brink: the survivor, the personal witness. We follow a cleaner in the Imperial Palace, forced to clean up the unspeakable debris of the dictator's pleasure-party, we are with the starving as they are compelled to endure government propaganda urging them to eat 'two meals a day' when they have been reduced to eating insects and tree-bark to stay alive. These aren't easy poems to read, yet they have the compelling urgency of a diary of contemporary tyranny and the havoc it wreaks on this particular family. This is a scorched family album, rescued from the ruins. – Amy Wack

Emma Simon - The Odds

These are poems by a versatile poet, drawing on a wide range of subject-matter and making use of an impressively handled variety of forms, including her own energetically updated version of Anglo-Saxon stress metre. Throughout the collection her working of the line is impressively tuned to what she evokes, from one poem's staccato measure tracing the thoughts racing through the mind of a disbelieved Harvey Weinstein victim to another enacting the hopping and sliding of a frog, from couplet to couplet. These two examples show something of the breadth of range in The Odds: in between we meet a latter-day Lady Macbeth, visit a poisonous laboratory (a tour de force, this one), walk on water, break down on the motorway, and find ourselves descending through space as earth-bound astronauts. All in all, a collection celebrating what MacNeice called 'the drunkenness of things being various' – and with style and panache. – Neil Astley
